The elder children were very keen to participate and their parents took interest to dress them properly as per their character. Kids enjoyed themselves thoroughly. Special lunch was served on that day.

who in turn hand over to the respective crèche teacher.

CRECHE CLINIC





The monsoon season gave a boost to all the water borne diseases and skin problems amongst children. The children suffered from fever, cold and wetness throughout this







AMICALE PATIENT ATTENDANCE





































Disease Pie chart For Amicale kids









Udaan Diseases chart







ADULT LITERACY PROGRAM

The new batch started in this quarter and was very keen to learn English because they are young but are school drop outs. Although they are slow learners, but are enthusiastic about their exposure visits, scrap book making and on classes with digital PPT presentations. They have visited Kumartulli where they watched the making of idols with clay, process of colouring and drying for the Hindu gods and goddess before the festive season. In this quarter the batch visited to Birla Temple to see the functions held due to the birth anniversary of Lord Krishna. The ladies saw that the classes are adding a lot of value in their life and thus they brought their own friends to attend the class.

Certificates were distributed to the previous Batch on the Independence Day. Girl's were excited and wanted to get engage in other courses where they would learn sometime. Few girl's had already migrated and thus they did not turn up to take their certificates.

The Bengali and Hindi Adult Literacy gave their exam on 19th August. This was the second batch from Jan Seva. Students, who could not get any opportunity in life to study, had a beautiful experience of appearing for a hall exam. They were shivering, nervous, excited and looking forward to finish the exam quickly. 15 students gave the Bengali exam, while 2 appeared for Hindi paper.

COMPUTER LITERACY PROGRAM

Although there has been a sharp reducing trend for student's admission in this course but Jan Seva had a new Batch starting from July 2017 consisting 13 students. These students will give their exam in Oct 2017. Mainly high school and college students opted for this course. All these students were more or less regular for their class as they have a vision to apply for jobs in the market.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING PROGRAM



This quarter was very busy time for VT program participants. As the exhibition was announced by our



emeritus Chairperson Dr Z.P Dadina to be held

on 20th Nov 2017, lot of work was assigned to this department. Uniforms were given only to the old students

who have made the stitching earlier and can finish it fast. The rest of the team concentrated on the making of towel sets, embroidery, Indian style party bags and baby frocks. Ladies became few in numbers because we deleted the irregular students



from our register. The ones who were told not to come understood that they have to be responsible with the embroidery they are being given and have to be through with their work.



A new art form was taken up under the guidance of Dr Adeline Jana named as Decoupage. It is a tough and tedious methodology to follow and transform the simple crocery in a beautiful piece

of art. A team of teacher's were engaged to make this art, which will be launched in the exhibition. An unique piece of art which is not easily available but has a capacity to pull all ages of people with its colourful attractiveness. Decoupage has being made on items like glass bottles,



glass coasters, tea lights, cups, plates, glass showpieces, glass

stands, metal pencil boxes, quarter plates and small bowls. Although the art in its own form is expensive to make but the finish product has utility to decor ones home especially during the festive season.





Jewellery making activity has picked up its own pace as the date for the exhibition was announced. Only a handful of VT girls were selected for this program with good sense of designs and colors were

taken into consideration who were taught by Dr Janak Hartnett. As jewellery in India is a pride for a woman, young ladies are taking lot of interest to learn how to make beautiful sets out of odd looking beads.
